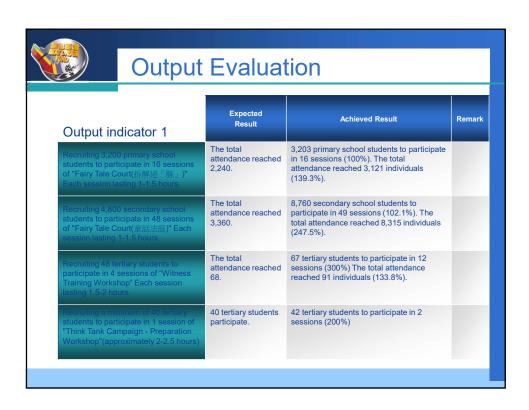

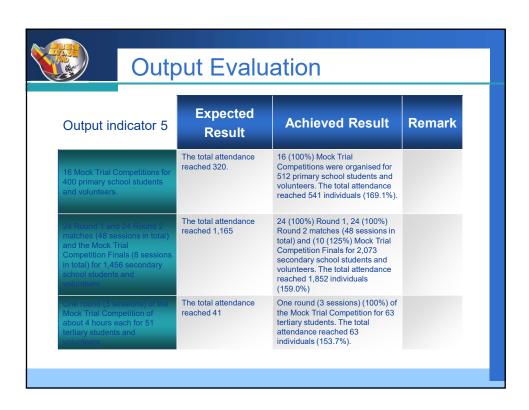

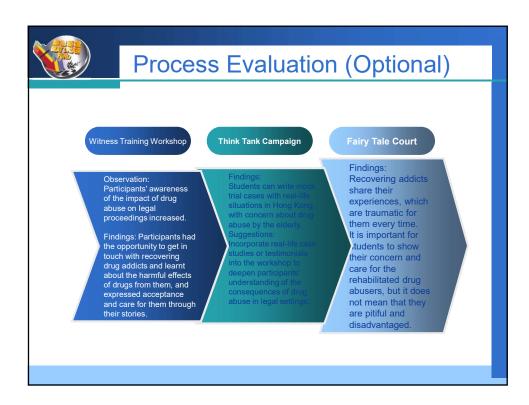

Process Evaluation

- Participants actively participated in the mock trial, taking on various roles such as lawyer, witnesses, and jurors.
- In order to find out the facts of criminal cases and satisfy their desire for knowledge, they will be more proactive in acquiring anti-drug knowledge.
- The anti drug education materials were effectively incorporated into the mock trial, providing relevant information on drug abuse prevention.
- The mock trial experience helped participants understand the legal implications and societal impact of drug-related offenses.
- Continuously update and enhance the anti-drug information(The control of cannabidiol) to ensure student remain current and relevant.





Experience Gained

- Joint efforts of the legal profession, social welfare sector, schools, volunteers and rehabilitated drug abusers in promoting the Scheme
- Active participation in the mock trial and activities fostered a sense of teamwork, cooperation, and healthy competition among the participants.









Other Findings

- During the puberty stage, young people often have a strong desire for independence from their parents or other authority figures. Recognizing this need, the project has created a platform for mentors to engage with students over a period of approximately six months. This extended duration allows mentors to establish meaningful connections with the students and deliver healthy and positive messages. Trustful relationships were developed.
- With the advent of electronic media, there has been a noticeable impact on the support provided to students by schools, communities, and families. The pervasive influence of electronic media has, to some extent, shifted the focus and resources that were traditionally allocated to supporting students.
- It is crucial for anti-drug messages to adapt and stay relevant to the trends and interests of today's youth. This approach ensures that the messages effectively resonate with young people and capture their attention. By keeping up with the youth trend, anti-drug campaigns can have a greater impact in promoting a drug-free lifestyle.
